- 1. Wave Rock, Western Australia
- 2. Red and Green Kangaroo Paw, Western Australia's floral emblem
- 3. Noni Hazelhurst
- 4. Brigadier-General (later Australian Governor General) Sir Peter Cosgrove
- 5. John Bertrand, skipper of Americas Cup winner Australia II
- 6. Bill Hunter, Australian actor d.2011
- 7. Ron Barassi, (84-year-old Australian Football legend)
- 8. Australian astronaut Andy Thomas
- 9. Queens Bridge Melbourne, built 1889. Houdini jumped from it in shackles. (He escaped.)
- 10. Australia's oldest functioning road bridge (1825), Richmond Tasmania
- 11. Bourke Street Melbourne looking West. (Named after Governor Bourke of New South Wales, not Burke of Burke & Wills.)
- 12. Michael Veitch, known early for several TV sketch comedy series, more recently as an author writing on aviation, marine science and travel.
- 13. The High Court of Australia (Canberra)
- 14. Queensland's Coat-of-Arms
- 15. Finding Nemo. Although classified as an American film, it was partly voiced by Australian actors including Barry Humphries, Bruce Spence, Eric Bana, Bill Hunter and Geoffrey Rush. Nemo is a Great Barrier Reef Clownfish. There's a problem with the story-line in that Great Barrier Reef clownfish change sex from male to female as they mature. Nemo's dad Marlin

would probably have been a female by the time he/she was reunited with his/her son/(daughter?)

- 16. This is the logo of the (soccer) A-League to which Hyundai has long held the naming rights. The A-League is currently contested by 11 teams: ten from Australia and one from New Zealand.
- 17. This is the logo of the NRL (National Rugby League)
- 18. Victoria Nicolls, (often misspelt as Nicholls), actress and television personality.
- 19. Helmeted honeyeater.
  - It's Victoria's only known endemic bird species. (In other words it is the only bird which lives in Victoria and nowhere else.)
  - It's an official emblem of Victoria.
  - It is critically endangered.
- 20. Flying fox a.k.a. fruit bat. Flying foxes in Australia are known to carry two infections which can pose a serious risk to human health Australian bat lyssavirus and Hendra virus. Transmission is rare, only occurring when the animals are handled.
