- 10. Virgil's heroic Trojan prince who survived to found Rome [6]
- 11. Daughter of Gaia and Uranus, older sister and wife of Chronos [4]
- 12. Greco-Egyptian mathematician and engineer of Alexandria. Considered the best remembered for his steam-powered devices and his mathematical formula for calculation of the area of a triangle using only the lengths of its sides [4]

- 13. A day in the Roman calendar that fell roughly in the middle of each month [4]
- 14. Roman equivalent of the Greek Hephaestus, god of fire, metalworking, stone masonry, forges, the art of sculpture, technology and blacksmiths [6]
- 15. Greek god of the underworld, the dead and riches, or the underworld itself [5]
- 19. Ancient seaport of the city of Rome [5]
- 21. Greek chief god [4]
- 22. Homer's epic poem about a 10-year siege of Troy [5]
- 24. Greek god of nature and the wild, often with goat-like horns and legs [3]
- 26. Greek epic poet of the late eighth or early seventh century BC [5]
- 28. Latin personification of the Sun [3]
- 30. Greek god of love, lust and sex [4]

- 37. The Greek philosopher Plato had early fame as this kind of athlete [8]
- 38. In Greek mythology, a fire-breathing lion, with the head of a goat projecting from its back, and a tail with a snake's head [8]
- 41. Roman equivalent of Poseidon, god of the sea, horses and other things [7]
- 42. Best known for slaying the Minotaur, he became king of Athens [7]
- 43. The mouthparts of a voracious animal [3]
- 48. Liquid cementing agent [4]
- 51. Definite article [3]
- 53. Roman household gods [5]
- 54. In both Greek and Roman mythology, one of several very old prophetesses [5]
- 55. Thick slice of meat, next to and often including a rib [4]
- 56. Last letter of the Greek alphabet [5]
- 57. Zeus's wife [4]
- 58. Challenge, provoke, goad [4]
- 59. Key figure in The Iliad, king of the Myrmidons [8]
- 60. Greek hero, later deified, renowned for his strength [8]

- 16. Important oracle situated in central Greece and sacred to Apollo [6]
- 17. Greek equivalent of the Roman god Mercury, whose duties included that of messenger [6]
- 18. Lazy or inactive [4]

- 20. Greek goddess, personification of the rainbow [4]
- 23. Her beauty is said to have "launched a thousand ships" [5]
- 25. Job title for a Roman priest who interpreted the will of the gods by studying the flight of birds [5]

- 29. Virginal Roman equivalent of the Greek Hestia, goddesses of hearth and home [5]
- 31. Homer's travel epic about the Greek hero known to Romans as Ulysses [7]
- 32. Construction for the purposes of cremation (e.g. as built by Achilles for Patroclus) [4]
- 34. Victim of fratricide by Rome's legendary founder [5]
- 38. The imaginary line that separates a pair of consecutive signs in the zodiac [4]
- 39. Roman equivalent of the Greek goddess of agriculture, Demeter [5]
- 40. In Greek mythology, the first woman; bestower of gifts, in one tradition the inadvertent releaser of all evils into the world [7]
- 43. Imported god, subject of a popular mystery cult among soldiers of the late classical Roman period [7]
- 44. Sob [4]
- 45. The unusual diet of the mares of Diomedes. Heracles was tasked with capturing them as one of his Twelve Labours [5]
- 46. Agricultural tool used for threshing of grain [5]
- 47. Also known as *Charis;* any one of the three Greek goddesses of charm, beauty, nature, human creativity, goodwill, and fertility [5]
- 49. Eagle's nest [5]
- 50. Roman goddess of the hunt, wild animals and the moon, usually equated with the Greek Artemis [5]
- 52. Greyish-white colour, often associated with the hair and beards of older people [4]
- 55. To relinquish or surrender power or territory [4]
